How to find chargers on the go

With tens of thousands of charging points and charging locations across the UK, it's easy to top up your e:Nyl.



Plenty of chargers to get you on your way

The UK has plenty of EV charging points:

48,450 charging points at 29,062 charging locations (August 2023)

And the network is growing at an average rate of 600 new points every month. You can find them at service stations, car parks, supermarkets, cinemas, and at the side of the road.

Public chargers at service stations are laid out much like petrol and diesel forecourts. With rapid charging units, they're especially good for longer journeys.

A rapid charger could give you an 80% charge in about 45 minutes.



The first and easiest tool for route-planning is your e:Nyl's sat nav.

But it's not the only one. There are numerous route-planning apps that you can download to your mobile for use only when your e:Ny1 is parked.



Pod Point Network

Pod Point has over 9,200 public charging bays across the UK. If they're conveniently spaced along your route, you know your e:Ny1 will be charged reliably.

Zapmap

Crowd sourcing and direct data feeds have made Zapmap the UK's number-one charge-point map. It claims to have the widest choice of charging options and offers real-time availability status. You can filter to the types of chargers and networks you need.











Charging on the go



Community charging - charge your car at a neighbour's home

If you don't have off-street parking or can't charge at home, there's a neat community alternative. It's called 'community charging' and it's a fast-growing approach to charging your car.

Community charging lets 'hosts' – EV owners with a driveway and a home charger – rent them out to EV owners who are unable to charge at their own homes. You find nearby hosts through apps such as Co Charger and JustCharge.

Use the apps to find a suitable host, book a charging slot, and pay for the electricity you use. Some will let you arrange a regular time slot to make charging even more convenient.

Hosts set their own rates, so costs vary. Check how much a charging session costs before you make a booking. Most hosts should have a proper domestic charge point.

Why not have a go yourself?

If you have a home charger, you could register to become a host and make a small profit on the service.
